 - a. Thought question: Since this is historical information, to what original event does this refer? (hint: its in Exodus)
 - b. What characteristics were they to possess?
- 6. To what terrifying "wilderness" does verse 19 refer?
- 7. Numbers 13 tells the original story of the sending out of the spies. What additional information does Moses give in Deut. 1:22, 23 about whose idea this originally was?

- a. Be prepared to explain the harmony between these two accounts:
