- 2) According to John 8:44; Revelation 12:9 and Genesis 3:1-5, what main qualities characterize(d) the devil?
- 3) Did God create the devil as he is depicted in the Bible? How does Genesis 1:31 describe all created things?
 - a. How might 2 Peter 2:4 and Revelation 12:7-9 help us to understand the origin of the devil?
- 4) How does the devil work to deceive humans?
- 5) Was the devil wrong to say that Eve would “know good and evil” by eating the forbidden fruit? (see verse 22)
- 6) Explain the difference in Adam and Eve’s sin (see 1 Tim. 2:14 for help):
- 7) Genesis 3:8, 10 contain an example of *anthropomorphism*, which is a figure of speech in which human attributes are attributed to God:
