- 4. Verses 7-14 alternate between what (Job had wrongly concluded) that God had done and was doing to him, and what others (his friends and criticizers) were doing to him.

- 5. What did Job say that he had "sewn" to his skin? What does he likely mean by this statement?
- 6. The word "horn" (v. 15) likely means personal strength or <u>honor</u>, or as some translate it, "head." Where had Job laid his head?
- 7. What had happened to Job's face? Why?
- 8. Job continues to maintain his faith and integrity:
 - a. How so in verse 17?
 - b. How so in verse 19?
- 9. As Job had earlier requested (13:19), what type of help does he request in verse 20?
 - a. *Thought Question:* Under the Gospel dispensation, Who serves in this capacity? (see 1 Tim. 2:5 for help)
- 10. What is the "way" or "path of no return?"
