- 2. If Job's troubles ("vexations") could have been measured by *weight,* how heavy would they have been?
 - a. What does Job admit in the last part of verse 3? (Note: King James users might want to consult another translation on this phrase.)
 - b. Consistent with this, in verse 26, how does Job characterize his speech?
- 3. After confessing to using impetuous language (v.3), Job seeks to explain his reasons for such language in verses 4-7:
 - a. What did the "arrows" from God represent?
 - b. What special type of arrows were these, and what is significant about such arrows?
 - c. What did Job illustrate by citing the wild donkey and the ox?
 - d. What point did he make by his comment about tasteless food? (Note: there are two likely applications:) Explain what Job means IF he here has reference to the speech of Eliphaz:

4. What was Job's "request" (see Job 3:21-ff for background) and what was his "hope?"

- 5. In verse 10 (in defiance of Eliphaz's speech), what does Job say that he had NOT done?
- 6. In verses 11-13, what reasons does Job give for wanting to die?
- 7. How does Job describe his friends in verses 14 and 15?
 - a. Verse 27 contains even a greater assault on their integrity: What does Job accuse these friends of being willing to do?
- 8. How does Job use temporary streams and water sources to make a point about his friends' advice?
- 9. What things had Job NOT asked of his friends? (22, 23)
- 10. How did Job say that he would react if he were taught properly?
- 11. In verse 25, what did Job acknowledge about truthful, forceful words of rebuke?
- 12. What did Job say was at stake in these discourses?
