- 1. Who is speaking in this chapter?
- 2. As he expressed in chapters 3 & 6, Job still longs for what event?
  - a. Verse 1 in the King James says, "Is there not an appointed time to man upon the earth." According to Hebrews 9:27, what is "appointed" for man?
  - b. In verses 1 and 2, what analogy does Job use to describe life and death?
- 3. What type of earthly life did Job expect (vs. 3, 7 and 16)?
- 4. From verses 4-6 and 14, list the physical and mental problems that Job had:

- 5. Verses Verses 8-10 describe the nature and consequences of death:
  - a. What point does he make about being seen after death?
  - b. What illustration does he cite for something quickly vanishing?
  - c. What is "Sheol," and what consequence does Job cite for one going there? (v. 9)

- d. Does Job deny the resurrection is verse 9? (hint: see 19:26)
- e. In this context, what did Job mean when he spoke of one not coming up from Sheol? (v. 9)
- 6. What does Job justify himself in doing? (v. 11)
- 7. What was Job's point in verses 17-19?
- 8. In the previous chapter Job denied having sinned against God. In verse 20 of this chapter he speaks of conditions "IF" he had sinned.
  - a. What does Job call God in this verse?
  - b. Assuming that he *had* sinned, what was Job implying about God's treatment of him in the series of questions in verses 20 and 21?
- 9. What time did Job assume was running out? (last part of 21)
