## **Judges 11**

- 1. The story of Jephthah runs through this chapter and into 12. It is not until verse 7 of chapter 12 that we see Jephthah identified as *what?*
- 2. Describe the character of Jephthah:
  - a. What former judge was similarly described by an angel? (6:12)
  - b. What was unusual about Jephthah's birth?
  - c. How did this situation affect Jephthah's (step)brothers?
- 3. Who made war against Israel?
  - a. Why did they make war against Israel? (see v. 13)
- 4. From the little that we know from this context, why did the Gileadites seek to make Jephthah their commander? (see 1 & 3 for help)
  - a. What logical reaction did Jephthah have to their request? (7)
  - b. What condition did Jephthah attach before consenting?
- 5. Considering verses 15-27: What arguments did Jephthah make to refute the claim of the Ammonite king?

- 6. How did the Ammonites react to Jephthah's well-reasoned and historically accurate arguments?
- 7. What came upon Jephthah and what did he do?
- 8. What famous, but hasty vow did Jephthah make to God?
  - a. According to verse 34, what (who) first came out of Jephthah's house?
- 9. Bible students have traditionally been divided over what exactly happened to Jephthah's daughter. According to Deuteronomy 12:31-32, what do we know about God's view of child sacrifice?
  - a. According to verse 39, what vow did she actually keep?
  - b. According to verses 37 and 38, what did Jephthah's daughter and her friends actually "bewail?"
  - c. The word "lament" or "commemorate" or "celebrate" in verse 40 is translated "rehearse" in Judges 5:11, and means "to talk with."
  - d. Neither Judges 11 or any other Bible passage teaches that Jephthah's daughter was offered as a burnt offering.
  - e. One translation of Judges 11:31 reads, "Whosoever shall come forth of the doors of my house to meet me, shall surely be the Lord's, and I will offer up to him a burnt-sacrifice."
- 10. Based upon these facts, what likely happened to Jephthah's daughter?
