## Romans 14

- 1. How has this chapter of Romans been misused in the past? (even by our own brethren)
  - a. Does this chapter address practices that are *inherently* wrong? (that is, wrong in and of themselves) (be prepared to explain your answer)
  - b. Verses 3, 14, 18 & 20 are key to a proper understanding of the types of behavior discussed in this chapter. In these verses, how does Paul describe the practices discussed in this chapter?
  - c. According to verses 1 & 3, what were Christians *not to do* regarding the types of differences discussed in this chapter?
  - d. What actual practices were listed in verses 2, 5, 6?
  - e. Why is it dangerous to take the view that Romans 14 addresses practices that are inherently sinful?
- 2. What does Paul mean in verse 1 when he speaks of one being "weak in the faith?"

- a. In Romans 15:1, what is contrasted with being "weak" in the faith?
- 3. In verses 4, 10-13, what action belongs only to God?
- 4. What warning does Paul give about food and wine?
- 5. Some liberal brethren have attempted to compare the drinking of the "wine" in verse 21 with the consumption of the fortified wines of today.
  - a. What are they missing with regard to how the the word "wine" is used in the Bible?
  - b. What are they missing with regard to this immediate context and the remote contexts of 1 Corinthians 8 & 10?
- 6. Sin is definitely discussed in this chapter, but not things that are sinful in and of themselves. What sin *is discussed* in this chapter? (vs. 20-23)
- 7. How is the word "faith" used in verse 23?
